

'Collaboration not Competition': New Delhi Rights Table

With the New Delhi World Book Fair 2025 witnessing a 30 percent growth over last year, the National Book Trust has encouraged Indian publishers to expand their global presence by joining the NBT pavilion at international book fairs "free of cost."

"The book industry grows when everyone grows—it is about collaboration, not competition. This is the only industry which will grow when everyone grows because we are not here to eat each other's pie; we are here to create a pie for each other", the Director of NBT, Col. Yuvraj Malik said at the inaugural session of the New Delhi Rights Table, one of the two B2B events at the ongoing NDWBF here.

"The fair has grown 30 percent compared to last year", the NBT Director, announced, contradicting the notion of a decline in reading habits and invited Indian publishers to join the NBT pavilion at international book fairs "free of cost to network and hold business meetings to expand their global presence."

Col. Malik, who is also the CEO of NDWBF, announced translation grants by NBT to support cross-language publishing and urged Indian publishers to go beyond English and Hindi and explore regional languages, highlighting the vast linguistic diversity in India.

The guidelines for applying will be uploaded post-NDWBF on the NBT website and social media. Support will also be extended to foreign publishers interested in Indian regional content, Col. Malik said outlining a string of commercial services offered by NBT to engage with the book industry in a big way.

The NBT could provide free-of-cost book launch facilities in Delhi with logistics arranged "within

15 minutes" at top locations, Col. Malik said as he invited countries to send eminent writers, poets, and illustrators for literary tours to India adding that NBT would cover their all their expenses for such events.

Buoyed by the success of NDWBF, Col. Malik also spoke about NBT's plans to set up a major book fair in South India with the same infrastructure and global outreach as Delhi.

Also in consideration is a 'Book to Screen' initiative that will allow authors to submit books for film adaptation. NBT, he said, would help authors reach out to top producers, directors, and actors for book-to-screen discussions.




Presenting the perspective of Russian Publishing Industry, Mr. Dmitry Silin, the International Relations Head of Russian Publishing House, said that "One of the most important tasks for us is to promote the Russian language all over the world, especially in Asia, where Russia's main trading partners are concentrated and where new forms of relationships are being built in various spheres—culture, science, and education."

NBT Chairman Prof. Milind Sudhakar Marathe drew focus to the scale of the event and its importance in global publishing and expressed optimism about the New Delhi Rights Table initiative. "I am hopeful that many good transfers of rights will come up through these two days."

Mr Kumar Vikram, Chief Editor and Joint director of NBT, emphasized upon the importance of books saying "If

there is a crisis in the book industry, then it won't be a crisis of the book industry; it will be a crisis of society."

The New Delhi Rights Table is a significant component of the World Book Fair 2025, focusing on B2B interactions in publishing. The two-day event facilitates rights exchanges, enabling books to be translated and published across different languages and markets. It encourages collaboration between Indian and international publishers, ensuring a diverse and rich literary landscape. It is also aimed at fostering global readership by facilitating the availability of quality literature in multiple languages.

Publishers as Nation Builders: CEOSpeak

The crucial role of publishers and creative industry in shaping national identity, culture and fostering a reading nation was highlighted by leading lights of the industry in an NBT-organized panel discussion based on the theme of the CEOSpeak event "Publishers as Nation Builders" as part of Republic@75 Dialogues.

The discussion featured insights from international experts



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Brooke O'Donnell, including Senior VP, IGP, Subramanyam Seshadri, Publisher, Overleaf LLP, Sergei Kaykin, General Director, JSC, General Directorate of International Book Exhibitions and Fairs, Pradeep Hasanta, CEO Goodreads Lanka, Sri Lanka and Kumar Vikram, Chief Editor, NBT. It was moderated Jaya Bhattacharji Rose, by International Publishing an Consultant.

NDWBF 2025 hosted the 12th edition of the CEOSpeak on Sunday bringing together leading national and international publishers from the Russian Federation, UAE, Sri Lanka and 50 other countries.

The gathering was addressed by the CEO of Niti Ayog, B.V.R. Subramanyam, Prof. Milind Sudhakar Marathe, NBT Chairman and Yuvraj Malik, NBT Director and Kumar Vikram,

Chief Editor and JD, NBT. The reports highlighting Russian publishing industry were presented by Evgeny Kapiev, CEO, Eksmo Publishing House and Tatiyana Solovyeva Editor-in-Chief, Alpina. Proza Publishing house. A report on the Moscow International Book Fair was also delivered by Sergei Kaykin, CEO, General Directorate of International Book Exhibitions and Fairs.



NBT releases first book on Prison Radio

Radio in Prison is the first book on prison radio in India released by the National Book Trust. Written by India's leading prison reformer and media educator Dr Vartika Nanda , this book documents and narrates the role of radio in improving prison life for inmates. As founder of Tinka Tinka Foundation, she has conceptualized, selected and trained the inmates, and executed prison radios in District Jail, Agra, District Jail, Dehradun and the state of Haryana without any financial support.

The book was released by Professor Milind Sudhakar Marathe, Chairman, NBT; Kumar Vikram, Chief Editor, NBT; Shri PN Pandey, DIG Prisons, Agra Range; Ms Mahek Kasbekar, Editor in Chief and Journalist, Brut India, as well as Dr. Vartika Nanda, founder, Tinka Tinka Foundation.

The Chairman in his welcome note emphasized on how Radio in Prison is a book that needs to be read by everyone. He stated that, in life, there are some events that are very moving. `This book has touched the lives of countless,' he stated.

The release of the book was followed by the presentation of a video encompassing Tinka Jail Radio and its culmination - the book itself. A song composed and sung by Dr Suchit Narang, a blind convict lodged in District Jail, Dehradun was the background score for the video. It resonated with the audience and evoked a range of emotions.

Ms Mahek Kasbekar moderated the session. She began the discussion by asking the author about the uniqueness of the concept of jail journalism, introduced by Tinka in Indian prisons, and its impact on the incarcerated souls. Dr Nanda gave a thoughtful insight about the inception, selection of inmates in jails as Radio Jockeys, their exceptional work, especially during COVID-19, and subsequently creating a reservoir of creative wealth in Indian prisons through the use of the microphone.

The Tinka Jail Radio model, jail podcasts, jail awards and books on jail life have all contributed to document the unknown aspects of prison life. She emphasized that jail radio has significantly contributed in decreasing depression and instances of aggression and self-harm in jails, because it has proved powerful in giving inmates a much needed safe space and creative outlet.

Shri PN Pandey assured that new prison radios would be initiated in UP Prisons soon. It is to be noted that UP Prisons have already included the suggestions made by Dr Nanda on the communication needs of women inmates and their children. This report was supported by ICSSR and was released by Shri Manoj Kumar Singh, Chief Secretary, Uttar Pradesh in August 2024.

The discussion concluded with Dr Nanda reflecting on how her work in prison reform has profoundly shaped her perspective, deepening her appreciation for freedom something many take for granted. The panel also welcomed insights from the audience, collectively expressing hope that ordinary citizens would engage with *Radio in Prison*, a book that seeks to illuminate the realities of life behind bars.

Contribution of Women in Law-making

"Laws shape societies, but who shapes the laws?" This thoughtprovoking question echoes through the pages of 'Kayade Nirmitit Shriyanche Yogdan', a Marathi book authored by Dr Vidya Deodhar. Released by National Book Trust (NBT) Chairman, Prof. Milind Sudhakar Marathe, at the ongoing Fair, the book sheds light on the often-overlooked contributions of women in lawmaking that stretches far beyond the parliamentary chambers and run deep into India's historical roots.

While laws today are debated and drafted in legislative halls, the journey of women's influence in lawmaking dates back to the Vedic period, says Dr Deodhar, who has presented an account of 450 such women in the aforementioned book that loosely translates as the contribution of women to lawmaking.

While this book includes the stories of remarkable women like Ghosha, Maitreyi, and Apala, who were trailblazers centuries ago, she is working on another book comprising 600 women in the medieval period, out of which 200 were freedom fighters.

Dr Deodhar emphasized that her book challenges the conventional understanding of women's role in governance. "Lawmakers often consider women's perspectives from a parliamentary lens, but my book delves deeper, tracing their influence from the Vedic period. These women were not just participants but they were also visionaries who shaped policies long before modern legislatures existed."

In a world where history often focuses on kings and conquerors, '*Kayade Nirmitit Shriyanche Yogdan*' rewrites the narrative, giving rightful space to the women who helped in crafting the laws that continue to guide us today.



Saudi Arabia's Stall Becomes a Cultural Hotspot at NDWBF

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The International Pavilion at the New Delhi World Book Fair (NDWBF), like every year, is once again drawing a massive crowd, with visitors eagerly exploring stalls set up by different countries. Among them, the Saudi Arabia stall has emerged as a major attraction, engaging a large number of people.

The Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, which was the Guest of Honour country in NDWBF 2024, is spread over a lavish enclosure which is divided into two key sections. One section highlights the renowned King Fahd National Library, showcasing its digital collections on a screen, while the other focuses on the country's Literature, Publishing, and Translation Commission. (headdress), have also become a point of interest, attracting visitors, eagerly taking selfies with them. One of the representatives, Majid, who is managing the

library section, shared his experience of being in India for the first time. "The experience has been excellent so far. Indian people are very friendly and welcoming. They are really liking our stall," he said, while posing for photos with visitors.

Saudi Arabia's participation in NDWBF aligns with its broader efforts to strengthen cultural cooperation with India, showcase its literary contributions, and promote intellectual exchange between the two nations, he said.

A part of this section is dedicated to the "Tarjem" initiative, which promotes Saudi Arabia's translation movement. Additionally, a wall display features a series of short story collections by Saudi authors, offering insights into the Arabian country's literary landscape, while another wall showcases comics and books for young readers.

Unlike many other countries' stalls, the Saudi stall does not sell books, but serves as an informative space where visitors can learn about the Kingdom's cultural and literary initiatives. Representatives at the stall, dressed in traditional Saudi *thobes* (loose gown) with *keffiyehs*

Sense Boring, Nonsense Interesting: Pankaj Tripathi


Handle your relationships with care, resolve pending conflicts, don't take success and failure too seriously, and strike up friendships with books, said beloved actor Pankaj Tripathi in a free-wheeling discussion organized by the Bharat Literary Festival.

Walking into the Theme Pavilion to a thunderous applause, the popular actor displayed a personality that is authentic, honest and emotional. Standing up throughout the hour-long discussion after a visitor said she wanted to see him better, Tripathi answered questions in his inimitable style - languid, pensive and visibly unpretentious.

Taking 20 questions from author Akshat Gupta, Tripathi spoke of how he would want to write satire and poetry if it comes to that but not about his journey because all human struggle is nearly similar. "If you desire something and do not get it, just bow to that truth, and move on," he said on a philosophical note. Asked about his association with literature, he said he started reading in his youth and has continued to do so.

Tripathi also announced the launch of an App called 'Velvet' – an audio platform that he has created in partnership with his friends to disseminate literary stories. "These tales increase the power of our imagination and help shape and refine our personality," he noted, encouraging the audience to read voraciously.

Overwhelmed by a cancer survivor who had come all the way from Bhopal to meet him, her idol, Tripathi got tearyeyed and confessed, "This love is the true earning of an actor. The material riches pale in comparison." Showered with love and adulation, he remained grounded and interacted with the eager enthusiastic spectators, teeming with die-hard fans. People asked him to recite dialogues. He did. They asked him impromptu questions. He responded. Admirers jostled with one another to take selfies with him. He obliged them. A consummate actor. A people's actor.









Book Release and Discussion: "Islam, Authoritarianism and Underdevelopment" by Ahmet T. Kuru



The Khusro Foundation organized an insightful event featuring the release and discussion of the book, *Islam, Authoritarianism and Underdevelopment: A Global and Historical Comparison* authored by Ahmet T. Kuru. The event brought together prominent speakers, including Mobashar Jawed Akbar as a keynote speaker and Hafeezur Rahman as the moderator.

The event ended with expressions of gratitude to all guests, speakers, and organizers. It offered a platform for critical discussions on history, religion, and socio-political challenges while under-scoring the importance of dialogue and intellectual engagement for societal progress.




